

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ANNUAL REPORT 2018 - 19

The Managing Committee of AWMH Maharashtra is pleased to present the **45th Annual Report** of the Association, along with the Audited Statement of Accounts for the Financial Year 2018-19. There has been all out enhancement in quality and quantum of our delivery of care & services for empowerment of children and persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities. We also strived towards making our services more and more useful to the increasing number of beneficiaries. This was made possible by the whole hearted cooperation and enthusiasm of our staff, and selfless support by the managing committee and members of AWMH and recognition of AWMH good work and whole hearted support from the individual donors and the institutional benefactors.

➤ **AWMH Services [Early Intervention Care, Sports, Recreation Activity Center]**

The year 2018-19 was a year of remarkable innovations and changes which have continued till the time of writing this report. We started many initiatives to consolidate our early intervention care services for children with developmental disabilities. This year we concentrated on enhancing the services with a clear and firm objective to ensure social inclusion and independent living of children with intellectual and developmental disabilities. We also worked on the principle that 'when you measure, only then can you monitor' the progress. Therefore we set our target to have evaluation of every child coming regularly to EIRP centers, and achieved it. Further we started monitoring the progress of each child in standardized criterion. The children who discontinue coming to the centers are also monitored for the reason and their post early intervention plan. This has given us a good benchmark to work and monitor the progress of each child on continuous basis. The level of services is also enhanced with the presence of two Occupational therapists, One part time physiotherapist and two part time Speech and Audiologists. We shifted the EIRP center at Dombivili from Manav Kalyan hospital to a leased space which is bigger/ spacious and far more convenient for parent/ children to access. The leased premises at Ghatkopar has also proved to be very rejuvenating for staff and children since it provides un-clustered neat and healthy space with a open green view. We are also glad to inform you that by November 2018 the strength of children in five centers had risen to over 150 children who come regularly to EIRP centers. This is a record of a sort for AWMH.

The sports center has been providing week-end coaching in various sports to students with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The two flagship tournaments viz Cricket and Table tennis, attracted many participants from schools across Maharashtra. The enthusiasm on the sports field was palatable with the participants' competitive spirit, sportsmanship and sense of achievement. Our sponsors; Goregaon Sports Club, Rotary Club of Mumbai - Versova and many individuals offered their services in cash and kind to make the competitions a great success. The cooking competition at Rizvi Catering College was also very satisfying

with flood of entries. The dishes prepared by participants surprised the judges as well as the instructors of Rizvi College.

The RAC club also closed the year with host of local and off site activities. Here again the persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities were encouraged to participate in planning and execution of events. The RAC coordinator thoughtfully designed and created gift diaries for RAC members that arose old memories and comradeship. In addition efforts are on to widen the base of membership by inviting persons from other organizations to join RAC. We hope to increase our membership of RAC giving opportunity to persons staying around south and central Mumbai. The RAC coordinator and volunteers attended Mentor training and plan to introduce Self Advocacy training program for our RAC members.

➤ **Consolidation of Operating procedures and processes**

AWMH also formed an AWMH Operations Manual based on the M/s Delloit inputs for operating Not-for-profit-organizations. This manual contains operating instructions for Human Resource management, Organization structure & Reporting, Financial accounting, Procurement process and Asset tracking, Delegation of financial powers, Financial planning and Statutory regulations and their follow up. As part of implementation of the Operating instructions Biometric Attendance Monitoring system were installed in all EIRP centers and Administrative office. Our employees have accepted it with grace. AWMH is also following up on statutory office procedures for Child Protection, Safety at work place/ POSH and ensuring Equal Opportunities for Persons with Disabilities.

➤ **Human Resource Management**

On human resource management we have made positive strides this year. Our staff in EIRP, Sports and administration remain motivated and dedicated to their work. In spite of providing absolutely free services in the EIRP centers, we have been able to bring up the remuneration of our staff at par with market. In addition a one-time special incentive was awarded to the staff in recognition of achieving 150 number mark of children attending our EILP centers regularly. That speaks of the professionalism and dedication of our staff. AWMH also encouraged staff to attend professional short courses to update and enhance their knowledge and managerial capabilities.

➤ **Partnerships and Community Awareness**

This year we also achieved good growth in our resource mobilization. The emphasis was to form long term relationships with existing donors and attract new donors for our activities. The founders of Dalal Family Foundation visited our Ghatkoper center during the year and seemed satisfied with our performance. They have now entered in to a strategic relationship with AWMH for funding two EIRP centers [Ghatkoper & Khetwadi]. In addition they will also associate with us for Cricket and Table Tennis tournaments. Tata Institute of Social Sciences [TISS] have partnership with us for Mankurd center whereby their student-interns develop our community outreach. TISS have now enhanced the scope of collaboration to cover all five early intervention

centers of AWMH. This will bring in good benefits in terms of creating community awareness, inclusion of children & families in the mainstream community. WIPRO have continued with their sponsorship and visited our centers to observe the progress of children first hand. We also participated in community awareness initiatives of WIPRO and Lilane Fonds. We conducted awareness about early intervention services at Mumbai CST and Dadar station, and also took initiative to go to schools for creating awareness among the school students and teachers under “Ring the bell” campaign .

➤ **Process of Sale of Pune Plot of Land**

As indicated during the last annual general meeting, we received approval for the sale of Pune plot of land from the Charity Commissioner. Later we applied to Collector, Pune, for permission to sell the land. However there were complications in the approval process under Section 63 of the Maharashtra Tenancy and Agricultural Lands Act regarding use of land for Agro vocational training by AWMH. The approval process much exceeded the one year time stipulated in the tender document. The buyer M/s Sai Developers, approved by the Charity Commissioner, back out from the deal. Therefore AWMH had to inform the Charity Commissioner and to get the approval revoked. The whole process will have to be initiated again for which necessary resolutions will be brought forward during this Annual General meeting.

➤ **Resource Mobilization & its Utilization**

AWMH remains sound in its financial status and making steady progress in increasing its reserves after meeting the expenditure for enhanced services. This was achieved by bringing in efficiency in financial management, not indulging in any avoidable expenditure, keeping the overheads low and further improving the ratio of expenditure incurred on objective of trust to the total expenditure. The treasurer brought in more discipline in our financial processes. The following are the highlights of our financial management:

- a. The expenditure towards providing services to persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities was Rs. 65,22,383 out of total expenditure of Rs. 72,66,601.
- b. This ratio works out to be approximately 90% as compared to the average of 80% for Not-for-profit-organizations.
- c. The donations received in the FY 2018-19 were Rs. 70,04,671 as compared to Rs. 45,74,414 received during FY 2017-18.
- d. We were able to manage our expenditure within the resources mobilized thru donations.

A. REPORTS OF DEPARTMENTS :

❖ **EARLY INTERVENTION PROJECT (EIRP)**

AWMH, Maharashtra is running 5 Early intervention centers across Maharashtra located in Mumbai & Suburbs (Dombivali, Mulund, Ghatkopar, Mankhurd and Khetwadi Center)

Early intervention services give specialized support to children and families in the early years (from birth to school entry - 6 yr.). This support includes:

- Special Education.
- Therapeutic Services.
- Counseling to parents.

All the programs or sessions aimed at promoting child's development. Any Intervention selected for a child is Family centered, Developmentally appropriate, Child focused, Supportive and Structured.

The Trans disciplinary team is characterized by the commitment of its members to teach, learn, and work together to implement coordinated services. This concept also enables us to provide therapeutic services to children with different types and degrees of delayed.

➤ **EIRP Activities from April 2018 to March 2019**

1. Shifting of Dombivili center to new premises: In June this year, the Manav Kalyan Hospital Management requested us to vacate the premises currently being used by us for the Early Intervention Center at Dombivali, as they required it to expand their services, thus in November; we shifted to the new premises at Kasturi Plaza. The place is just 5 min walk from the station and also from our old center at Manav Kalyan Hospital.
2. Training Kolhapur EI Professionals: In June Dr. Shital Fulzele, Occupational Therapist, conducted one day training session for Special educators in Kolhapur in response to their invitation. It was organized by Sangli Mission Society, Harley Kolhapur. The workshop was attended by 37 participants, mostly special educator, some Speech therapist and physiotherapist.

3. Training Baramulla, J&K, Parents running Special School- Ms. Anjali Bijur, Senior Special Educator and Parent and Dr. Shital Fulzele were invited to Baramullah, Kashmir to conduct 2 days training program for special educators and parents. Around 32 children along with their parents were assessed for occupational therapy and appropriate programme were given. All Parents were trained for ADL and different skills for progression of development in different areas like physical, cognitive, social, communication and language.
4. Opening new Early Intervention Center at Pen, Raigarh dist- AWMH in collaboration with Suhit Jeevan Trust opened a new early intervention center at Pen. This center is part of new building constructed by Suhit Jeevan trust to provide one stop services to children and persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Mr. Nitin Gadkari, Minister of Transport, GOI, was the Chief Guest and inaugurated the building and the new EIRP center. AWMH set up the center which attracted lots of parents to get therapeutic services for their children. After 6 months Mr Gadkari directed the Jwaharlal Nehru Port Trust which is in the same district to sponsor the services. Therefore AWMH came out of Penn but still continues to provide expertise to the EIRP center.
5. Vatsalya Trust, Kanjur Marg Supported 50 children from EIRP for orthotics during the period April 2018 to march 2019, The Center coordinated with Vatsalya Trust to provide light-weight orthotics free of cost.

6. Community Awareness Campaign : EIRP initiated awareness campaign on the occasion of Disability day (3rd Dec). The Grass-root Comic Poster Campaign, wherein comics made by children with disability at the institutions assisted by CHAI-LF were show-cased at suitable venues. On 17 December 2018 AWMH undertook the Grass-root Comic Poster Campaign at Dadar and CST railway stations. The campaign drew a good response from the public as well as the railway authorities.

7. Psychological assessments and counseling

The Clinical Psychologist has completed psychological assessments of all children who are more than 2 years old. Many parents who visited the Center with their child are full of anxiety and uncertainty. These parents were counseled into accepting the situation unconditionally, and gear themselves to provide the necessary support.

8. Speech Therapy

Almost 80% of the children at the Center present have speech issues. To provide required services AWMH employed 2 part-time Speech and Language Therapists. These specialists cover 2 Centers (Makhurd and Dombivali) and comes every Saturday to treat children with speech deficiency.

9. Group Therapy Sessions:

Children registered at the Center often have very limited social skills due to inherent developmental delays and also discrimination at home and in the society. The Special Educators at the Center conducted group sessions with play activities to improve the child's social skills. Once in a week group sessions is organized for children, which enhance and improve their abilities in different areas of development like gross motor, fine motor skills, cognitive and perceptual skills, social skills, and self-help skills. These two hours group sessions with different themes are organized in 2 batches –morning and afternoon.

10. EIRP CBR Activity for enabling Social Inclusion:

- 18th Dec 2018- Mankhurd center picnic to Sagar Vihar, Garden and lake. Vashi, Navi Mumbai.

- 18 Jan 2019-Dombivali center picnic to Birla Temple, Shahad.

A great day for all the students and parents, staff as well, as it strengthen the bond between the children. Therapists, community and volunteers. Everyone enjoyed and had great fun. Outdoor visits also gave a much required fun filled time to mothers who are stressed out with their daily caregiving and home making activities.

➤ **The discussion during Parent meetings is generally on the following lines:**

The documentation status of cases are discussed in general. The documents like disability certificate, ADHAR card and other documents. General difficulties regarding documentation process were discussed and measures to ease up the process were discussed. NIRAMAYA scheme was also discussed and whether the children have been enrolled for the insurance scheme. The provisions of railway concession tickets and differential fare system were discussed. A session on feedbacks, comments and suggestions was taken. Quite a few ideas from both sides were discussed. These sessions are important to chart the plan of action. The need for therapy and required attention to make the child independent at his/ her level is emphasized. The idea to train the parents was discussed and was well received. Through this way the care givers would have an increased participation in child's therapies. There are different therapies to help different development areas and the difference between them was discussed with parents. The next point of emphasis was on attendance. We emphasized on the importance of regularity in the therapies. The therapies work the best in continuity hence the parents need to be proactive in ensuring daily therapies of the child. The information on social gathering, an annual event, was given. The importance of a group and cohesiveness was also shared. The parents who have been a part of the center since a while need to make the new members comfortable. This would enhance the participation and the overall development of the center.

12. Celebrations: Festivals and Group therapies are the key to encourage social inclusion of children with developmental delays. These are good occasions to encourage participation and instill social skills of sharing and reciprocity. The period brought with it, some major occasions to celebrate:

- 14th Jan 2018 – Makar Sankrant
- 25th Jan 2019 - Republic day
- 22 march 2019- Holi celebration
- Children Birthday celebration-At the end of every month, children birthdays were celebrated in the centers

13. Home-visits: The staff at Centers visited the homes of children to understand the conditions prevailing there. Parents, family members, were made aware of the importance of EI Therapy, and how it could impact the development of their child during home visit.

14. Children enrolled in special or inclusive schools :

The objective of Early Intervention at the Centers is to prepare the child for admission to an inclusive (mainstream) or Special School. The therapy and pre-school training brings about good improvement in the cognitive, sensory and social abilities and children have been able to join schools. During the period April 2018 to March 2019, totally 38 children got admitted to either a Special or and Inclusive school. Following children from our EIRP centers were able to join inclusive and special schools

➤ Encouraging Sports in Special Schools :

C. MINUTES OF THE 44th ANNUAL GENERAL BODY MEETING HELD ON 11th AUGUST 2018 AT YWCA, MUMBAI

The Secretary called the meeting to order at 2:30 PM. Cdr. Shrirang Bijur, President, chaired the meeting. 54 members attended the meeting.

1. Welcome Address by President :

Thereafter he read the annual report a copy of which was already distributed to the members.

The Managing Committee of AWMH Maharashtra is pleased to present the 44th Annual Report of the Association, along with the Audited Statement of Accounts for the Financial Year

2017-18. Printed copies of Annual Report 2017-18 was distributed to all members present in the Annual General Meeting.

2. To read and approve minutes of the 43rd Annual General Meeting

The Secretary Ms. Meena Parkeh presented the minutes of the last Annual General Meeting held on 12th August 2017 which had been circulated to members in the Annual report copy. Dr. Sunny proposed to members that they can point out any changes/ amendments required otherwise the minutes can be approved. Mrs. Purnima Shah proposed and Mr. J. K. Aggarwal seconded that the Minutes be passed. The following resolution was taken up by the General Body.

Resolution : "Resolved unanimously that the Minutes of the 43rd Annual General Meeting held on Saturday, 12th August 2017, be and are hereby accepted and passed".

3. To consider and adopt the Annual Report for the year 2016 - 17.

At this point the President requested coordinators of respective AWMH verticals to present their department report. The following persons presented reports. A copy of all presentations are available on AWMH portal. :

Dr. Vaishali Kolhe, Professor, TISS, was invited by the President to narrate the status of collaboration between TISS and AWMH and also enlighten the general body regarding modern measures being developed and implemented by TISS for social inclusion. Prof Kolhe spoke for 15 minutes where she narrated how the home visits by volunteers / TISS students/ AWMH center staff has made a difference in the life of families who otherwise felt isolated and marginalized with in their neighborhood. She also highlighted the methods being tested and employed in bring in the poorest families (rag pickers) for getting the benefits

from mainstream schemes.

The president thereafter requested the General body to pass the report. Ms. Swarupa Modi proposed and Ms. Malti Dedhia seconded that the report be accepted.

4. To consider and adopt the Audited Statement of Accounts for the financial year 2017-18 along with the Audit Report

Dr. Sunny Pariyaram, Hon. Treasurer, presented the Audited Accounts of AWMH, Maharashtra which had been circulated to members earlier. He informed the members that donations and sponsorships amounting to around Rs. 45 lac were received. He informed members that approx.. expenditure incurred on the objects of the Trust was Rs. 43 lac. He further clarified that auditors have found no irregularities or issues in our accounts since they are well maintained and transparently held. He requests the general body to pass the accounts.

Ms. Nina Parikh proposed and Mrs. Vilur Shapoorjee proposed the annual accounts to be passed and Mrs. Swarupa Modi seconded the proposal. The following Resolution was tabled:

5. To consider and approve the budget for the financial year 2018 - 19

Dr. Sunny Pariyaram presented the estimated budget for 2018 - 19 which have been worked out meticulously by the accounts and line department.

Ms. Bharti Ganjawala proposed and Mr. Karsi Kapadia seconded that the estimated budget be accepted and passed. The following Resolution was tabled:

6. To appoint Auditors for the Financial Year 2018 - 19, and to fix their remuneration.

The Treasurer recommended that M/s. Shashikant Desai and Co. be continued as Auditor of AWMH Maharashtra for the Financial Year 2016-17 at a remuneration of Rs 15,000/- (Rs Fifteen Thousand only).

Ms. Swarupa. Modi proposed and Ms. Nina Parikh seconded this recommendation and the following Resolution was passed unanimously:

Resolution : “Resolved that M/s. Shashikant Desai and Co. be and are hereby appointed as the Auditors of AWMH Maharashtra, for the Financial Year 2018 - 19, at a remuneration of Rs. 15,000/- (Rs. Fifteen Thousand only) for the said period”.

7. To introduce new members admitted since the last AGM held on 8th August, 2015

The president read out the names of new members introduced in 2017-18. The members present stood up and were welcomed by general body. The names are at enclosure in the AGM minutes file

8. To discuss new initiatives planned by Executive Committee for expanding AWMH operations.

The General Body was informed that Executive committee has proposed to open a new Early Intervention centre in Penn Taluka in Alibagh district. This would provide access to rural population of Penn and adjoining villages to get their children treated for developmental delays. It would also support AWMH long pending desire to expand its foot print outside Mumbai which is also a priority theme of funding agencies. The members much appreciated the initiative and passed the following resolution to approve the project.

Resolution: Proposed that General body approves opening another early intervention center and pre-schooling unit in Penn Taluka of Alibagh district in association with Suhit Jeevan Trust of Penn. Proposed by Ms. Bharti Ganjawalla and seconded by Ms. Purnima Shah Passed unanimously.

9. To brief members on the latest plans and schemes proposed by civil society for empowerment of persons with intellectual disabilities.

Cdr. Bijur briefed the General Body about the latest plans and schemes:

- i. National plan for persons with developmental disabilities being prepared by MSJE
- ii. Niramay and new health insurance schemes for PwIDds.
- iii. Self advocacy being introduced as part of capacity building for skill training.

10. To consider status of sale of our Pune land

The President informed the General Body that Charity Commissioner has passed order for sale of land. After that application was submitted to Collector, Pune. Here the file had gone to Talati where it was given positive recommendation and sent to Sub divisional magistrate. The file is under process in this office and we are pursuing it.

11. To consider any other matter with the permission of the chair

The president told the general body that house is open for members to put forward their point and suggestions for improvement. He also encouraged the parents present in the meeting, whose children are availing early intervention care, to come forward and narrate their experiences for the management to get

feedback. This would help us to enhancing the services. The following parents came to the front and narrated their experience.

SUCCESS STORIES

Drushti Mane

Background : Drushti is 4 yrs. year old girl, who has been receiving early Intervention at AWMH since sept 2015. Drushti was born out of full term normal delivery; Cried immediately after birth and birth weight was 2.4 kg. She had history of meningitis and had 1st convulsive episode on 15th day of life. Child had delay in all the developmental domains and hence referred to AWMH for early intervention by pediatric OPD, JJ hospital byculla.

Darshana was evaluated by Occupational Therapist and Special Educator in AWMH to address Motor, cognitive, social, communication and self -care development. She demonstrated tightness of left extremities with delayed developmental milestone as evidenced by inability to hold her head, roll over. She used to sit with stooped posture leaning towards right side .Gross Motor Function Measure (GMFM) score was 20%. Her hand functions were poor, she didn't use her left hand to hold object and gross grasp was present in right hand. Her cognitive skills were poor. She has poor visual skills with complaints of Consecutive Esotropia and Nystagmus, was operated for the same.

Course of Treatment: Occupational therapist used different approaches including therapeutic exercises clubbed with playful activities to increase Range of movement and flexibility. OT focus on encouraging transitional movements such as sitting, walking and playing using range of intervention such as repetitive movement training and equipment ,e.g. walking frame ,supportive seating and orthotics, which further improves child's posture and alignment. Sensory integration therapy approaches were used to help child process and interpret sensory input. Visual Stimulation was used to develop focus and perception of depth.

Special educator is using multisensory input approach to help Drushti improve in different areas. Group sessions were organized to facilitate social skills of greeting others, sharing toys and reciprocity. Activities such as transfer of objects, tower making with blocks, cylindrical pegs, catching ball, hitting a target etc. are done to facilitate eye hand coordination. For improving cognitive and perceptual skill activities such as discriminating objects based on color, shape and size is being done. For improving use of left hand with awareness of left side of body different sensory stimulus are given over left extremity along with facilitation of bilateral use of hands.

Result&Impact:- After coming to AWMH for around 4 years, Drushti has shown considerable improvement. She pulls herself to stand from squatting and walks independently. Her GMFM score increases to 74%. Use of left hand has increased comparatively. She bangs on tambourine with left hand, as she likes the sound produced by it. Her cognitive skills are improving as she shows body parts (hands, legs, facial features). She speaks single words .She imitates dance steps using gestures and with hands movement when ask to do. She likes to play with other children in group.

As a result of following holistic approach Drushti is making remarkable improvement in her all developmental domains.



Urvi

Background : Urvi is 4y; year old girl who has been receiving Early Intervention at AWMH Since February of 2016.urvi is only child to her parents and lives with her parents and grandparents. Her mother is homemaker and father is in private service.

Urvi is born out of full term normal delivery, her birth cry was delayed and birth weight was 2.700 gms. She had convulsion on 2nd day of life and was kept in NICU for a month. Child had delay in all the developmental

domains and hence referred to AWMH for early intervention by her pediatrician.

Occupational therapist and special educator evaluated and assessed, problems identified were, delay in gross motor, social, cognitive functioning as evidence by inability to sit independently. Limited movements of UE (upper extremities) due to spasticity. She had poor cognitive skills and impairment in optics /vision.

Cause of Treatment : Occupation therapist used Neurodevelopmental Therapy (NDT) approach to improve posture and facilitate normal motor developmental and function without contractures and deformities. Therapeutic handling using sensory stimuli was used to inhibit abnormal reflexes, spasticity and abnormal movement pattern and to facilitate normal muscle tone and equilibrium reaction. Simple functional gross motor exercises e.g. rollover, come to sit, sit to stand, standing and walking were done to improve dynamic balance and postural stability during transitions and gait .Trunk strengthening exercises to improve postural alignment and functional muscle strength. Core muscles groups are activated through various functional activities in antigravity postures. Use of sensory stimulation to improve body awareness is being done. Vestibular and proprioceptive stimulations are given to improve balance and to relax spastic muscles reducing tone on therapy ball.

Orthotic intervention is aimed at prevention and correction of deformities, provision of support and improvement of gait.

Special Educator works with family and used multisensory approach to help Urvi achieve success in different areas. Play-way method was used adapting toys into therapeutic activities to gain hand function of reaching, grasp and release .Training in visual and fine motor skills helps improve function of self-care such as feeding . Group therapy and home visits were conducted to facilitate social skills.

Result & Impact : After continuing Early Intervention for 3 years, Urvi is showing good improvement in her areas of concerns, she is now able to maintain static balance during standing for longer period (count of 100), and she walks 5steps forward without support under supervision. She crawls with alternate movements of extremities as means of mobility. She is now able to pick up small pegs with fingers and put it in container. Her cognitive skills are improving as she recognizes colors, shapes and common objects .she is able to discriminate fruits, vegetables, domestic animals and transport. She has improved bilateral integration of upper limb.

As a result of following holistic approach Urvi is making remarkable improvement in her all developmental domains.



Akansha Begu

Background: Akansha is 2nd child was born out of full term cesarian delivery; mother had history of prolong labor. She had history of delayed cry and birth weight was 3.6 kg.

History of NICU stay for 10 day after birth .She had one episode of convulsion at the time of birth, no episodes after that. She had delayed developmental milestone and was taking therapy in one of the private therapy center, but due to financial problem her mother could not continue after 2 month. At the age of 1 yr, she gets to know about AWMH from one of the old parents of AWMH, and came to restart therapy.

In AWMH, Akansha was evaluated and assessed by Special educator and Occupational therapist. Akansha came with complaints of delayed developmental milestone, Her gross motor and Fine motor skills were poor ,partial Neck control

achieved, was sitting with maximum support (in mother's lap), standing not achieved.

Fine Motor : Midline not achieved, use right hand more than left. Grasps objects with gross grasp and transfers it to mother with full range of shoulder joint. Posture And Movement: Symmetrical posture when lying supine. Stooped posture as seen in sitting, Genu Recurvatum (hyperextension of knee) present in standing with maximum support.

She had generalized hypotonia in body. Range of movement seen in UE and LE are within normal range, Balance is poor in both static postures as well as during transistations. Oro motor-She used to eat only semisolid food. Speech and communication: Speech not developed, make 'Ah' sound only. ADL-Akansha is dependent for all her ADLs including eating, grooming, hygiene, dressing, toileting and ambulation. On the basis of assessment therapeutic goals were set and intervention started.

Course of Treatment : Occupational Therapist used Neurodevelopmental therapy approach to improve posture and balance, helping her to achieve gross motor and fine motor skills and facilitate developmental milestone. Core muscles groups are activated through various functional activities in antigravity postures All exercises are clubbed with different play activities with therapist defined purpose. Proprioceptive and vestibular stimulation on therapy ball were given to improve body tone and balance. Use of sensory stimulation to improve body awareness is being done.

Special Educator is using multisensory input approach to help Akansha improve in different areas. Group sessions are organized to facilitate social skills of greeting others, sharing toys and reciprocity. Activities such as transfer of objects, tower making with blocks, cylindrical pegs, catching ball etc. are done to facilitate eye hand coordination. For improving cognitive and perceptual skill activities such as discriminating objects based on color, shape and size is being done. For improving use of left hand with awareness of left side of body different sensory stimulus were given over left extremity along with facilitation of bilateral use of hands.

Result & Impact : After coming to AWMH for around 3 years, Akansha has shown considerable improvement. She pulls herself to stand with support of furniture; she takes steps forward when one hand held. Use of left hand has increased comparatively. Her cognitive skills are improving as she identifies family members; distinguish between familiar faces and strangers. She likes playing with ball and swinging. She expresses her needs through gesture. She likes to play with other children but plays on her own. She eats very small piece of chapatti, and dry food on her own. According to her mother she responds being called by name and understands simple command, she started going Anganwadi where she sits for around one hour, listen rhymes and play with other children. As a result of following holistic approach Akansha is making remarkable improvement in her all developmental domains.

Kabir Kumtha : Life is for the living!

On 9th March, my son Kabir received a special award from the 'Asian Physiotherapy & Research Institute' (APRI) in Surat, for his journey of survival from a near fatal fall to becoming an autistic entrepreneur. He was chosen from around 150 nominations from the country.

It has been a long journey for Kabir.

Kabir has autism. When he was 3½ years, he fell from a height of around 40 feet. He had many bones fractured, a contusion on his brain, was in coma for 10 days in which period he ran a temperature of 108o and had severe convulsions. The doctors could not give much hopes of a revival. When he came out of coma, he had no expressions on his face and no recognition. He was a re-born Kabir. He learnt everything right from moving his eyes and holding his neck all over again. He stayed in the hospital for two months and when he came home, he took his feed via a tube through his nose...

The fall made him a person with multiple challenges. But Kabir, the courageous fighter, has worked very hard over the years to challenge his challenges!

Today, Kabir is a 26-years young entrepreneur. He has been working at a sheltered workshop for eight years now. He loves meeting people and going to new places with his family and friends. He is passionate about music, swimming, geometric puzzles and gyming.

He has an enterprise of his own, called Kabir's Kreations. He is a florist who makes and sells torans and haars. His (and his customers') favourite flower is marigold but he has worked with other flowers too. He makes various designs and gets orders for various occasions: birthdays, anniversaries, marriages, remembrances, pujas, meditation sessions, formal functions, festivals like Dasara-Diwali, Parsi New Year, Gandhi Jayanti etc.; for private gods to sarvajanic Ganapatis, photos-idols to trousseaus, doorframes to cars. Persons from out of town have also booked for his garlands in advance for their scheduled trip to Mumbai. Kabir gets the creative joy of art and craft of making the torans and haars. Seeing his Facebook page (Kabir's Kreations), many persons with disabilities all over India have taken inspiration and started garland-making!

Kabir's Kreations recently expanded by involving other special adults and introducing a range of new products like spectacle chains, paper bags, etc.

Last year, he was felicitated by 'Forum for Autism' as a young autistic entrepreneur. Some magazines carried articles on him. His latest award by APRI is aptly titled 'Rukna Nahi'. Kabir has never stopped and in future too, will always strive to push the envelope further!

Croydon Fernandes

AWMH/RAC member Croydon Fernandes is very enthusiastic about working in the terrace garden. He waters the plants twice a day. Removes the weeds (if any) from the pots and helps in planting/replanting seeds /saplings.

Besides this he helps in the packing and dispatching the orders for soil amendments and potting mixes we receive on amazon / Flipkart and direct. This has kept him occupied. Also he feeds our 3 cats in our terrace garden whom we have kept to keep rats at bay.

He is everyone's favourite games captain. He readily organises whatever games other members are interested in playing. He also knows exactly where and how to fix and use the speaker when they want to enjoy some music. During snack time, he helps in arranging and distributing plates and makes sure that tables are clean before we leave the hall.



Mihir was born on 7th March 1974 and was brought up at Warden Court, Cumballa Hill, Mumbai. His early childhood seemed quite normal. But his delayed milestones worried his mother, Anilaben. She spent more than an year getting various tests done in ENT department of Nair Hospital. Since any sensory disorder was ruled out, his case was referred to Psychology department. There through different tests, his mental disability was detected. Anilaben was advised to send him to regular Gujrati medium school so that comprehension and learning in his mother tongue would be easy for him.

Not satisfied with his progress in the school, the parents, Dineshbhai and Anilaben took the right decision to admit Mihir in Sadhana School for Children with Special Needs. Mihir graduated from this institution at the age of 18. He is very proud of his Graduation Certificate which he received from Mrs. Jaya Bacchan!

Sister Gaitonde, the Principal of Sadhana School in those days pointed out to his parents that his friendly nature could help him overcome his verbal communication in doing freelance salesmanship. And thus from 1991-92 started his long successful career as a salesman.

Mihir's day starts early. Daily visit to the nearby temple is a must for him. After he gets back, he helps his mother in doing daily chores. After his breakfast he starts his work, delivering the orders placed by his clients.

Mihir is very proud of his large clientele which consists of the staff and students of Sadhana School and Sophia College, residents of nearby buildings and shopkeepers. His friendly demeanour and helpful nature adds new friends to his circle. The list of items he provides is quite long—from packed snacks, farsan, chocolates, quality traditional mithai to household cleaning items to socks, handkerchiefs, caps etc. You name it and he readily provides it!

Mihir gets his merchandise from Paidhuni, toiletries from Nal Bazar and food items from Jain and Marwadi wholesalers from Vikroli. He likes visiting markets to place and get his orders. As he has been doing business with these merchants since long, they home deliver his orders. Anilaben helps him to telephonically place orders and in settling the accounts. Mihir can read the MRP rates of the items so can deal with his clients with ease.

Anilaben says that Mihir had a very happy childhood with his loving and protective brother, Rahul who was little older to him. He and their father taught Mihir the ropes of business. Their inspiration gave him confidence to go out unaided for his business. Though Dineshbhai passed away fifteen years back, Rahul was his support. But Rahul's untimely demise a few years back was a big jolt to Mihir and took quite some time for him to come out of it. Loving encouragement of his mother and large circle of friends has helped him to get back on his feet again. His affection and deep concern for his mother is exemplary! He is of firm conviction that he and his mother will continue to stay in their present house and he will carry on his business from there.

Maltiben and Ramnikbhai's eldest son Nilesh was born on 3rd August, 1971 in their native village. As he was a premature baby, the parents brought him back to Mumbai after one month. A hospital stay of fifteen days stabilised his health.



Nilesh was admitted in a regular school after he completed three years but the family was not much happy with his progress. It was a bit of a shock for them when the Principal of the school suggested a special school for him. Maltiben still tried two three more schools for him.




